World Religions Outdoors: The Jewish Festival of Sukkot

Religious Studies Activity

All levels

Challenge pupils to create a suitable shelter 'sukkah' to mark the festival of Sukkot adhering to traditional specifications.

- Through investigating and reflecting upon the ways in which followers of world religions mark major life events and times of year, I can explain key features of such festivals and celebrations (RME 2-06b)
- A1 Recall and name different beliefs and practices, including festivals, worship, rituals and ways of life, in order to find out more about the meanings behind them (KS1)
- Pupils should be given opportunities to: recall, describe and begin to explain religious beliefs, teachings and practices (KS3)
- Recognising the similarities and differences between cultures, for example food, clothes, symbols, celebrations (KS2)
- Be able to identify essential elements of the beliefs and symbols of the chosen major world religions (Junior certificate Part 3)

Suggested Equipment

Tarpaulins
Sheets
Long sticks
Fixed posts or trees

Judaism – Sukkah

The Jewish festival of Sukkot can be marked by building a shelter or 'sukkah' which is used for the 7 day duration. The shelter commemorates the time that the Israelites spent in the wilderness after they were freed from slavery in Egypt.

Sukkah Specifications:

- 1. Be large enough to fit at least 1 person, a table for eating and a space for sleeping
- 2. 2½-4 windproof walls
- 3. A roof made of only 'sechach'- raw plant material
- 4. The roof must provide shade but also gaps to view the sun/stars
- 5. It must have a doorway
- 6. It must not be under any other form of shelter



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
